Bookings for Yearly Meeting Gathering 2020 are now open and a brochure has been sent to meetings. This document contains practical information about the Gathering as well as material to help you prepare for Yearly Meeting. The information contained in the brochure is also available on the website www.quaker.org.uk/ym along with a PDF version of the brochure and a PDF version of the preparation materials.

The theme for the Gathering is *Listening*, *prophecy and reconciliation: allyship in a climate emergency*. This theme was discerned by young Friends on Junior Yearly Meeting Arrangements Committee and their leadership has been welcomed. The suggested resources contained on the website and in the brochure include links to podcasts on allyship, climate change and activism as well as other written resources. It is hoped to build on these resources between now and the Gathering. Also available on the website is the draft outline timetable.

It is hoped to build a Gathering full of worship, fun, conversation, sharing, hope, games, learning, community and above all challenge.

AREA MEETING EMAILS HAVE CHANGED!

You may have noticed that our new website has the same name as the old one, except that it now has a '.uk' at the end. In turn all of the emails for roleholders which previously ended in @nottsandderbyquakers.org will now instead end in @nottsandderbyquakers.org.uk. So, for all of the email addresses on Page 6 of the yellow Area Meeting Contact List, simply add a '.uk' at the end. In addition, Local Meetings have each been offered their own email address via our website.

Do make use of these email addresses! They are particularly useful to Area Meeting role holders who might wish to contact a large number of Friends on a regular basis – for instance to get in touch with all the Elders and Overseers when meetings are being organised, or to share information with the Local Meeting Clerks. Alternatively you might wish to publicise an event, send details of a funeral, ask advice from other meetings, or notify people of a new role holder or the cancellation of an event.

The email address links are updated when roleholders change, although for Local Meeting appointments we rely on Local Meetings to inform us of changes. Assisted Dying Workshop

Quakers in Britain are being encouraged to further explore the issue of assisted dying, and dying and death more generally, recognizing that there are differing and deeplyheld views. A workshop on this theme has been arranged for our Area Meeting.

This is a very moving film outlining the experience of two families and with input from those involved with the organization Dignity in Dying.

A BLOG WITH A DIFFERENCE

Rhiannon Grant, who is part of the Programmes Team at Woodbrooke and who previously came to Beeston Meeting, writes a wide-ranging blog that includes many Quaker themes under the name: Brigid, Fox, and Buddha.

Following the presentation at our last Area Meeting by Nottingham Young Friends which covered a range of **LGBTIQA+ Issues**, I thought Friends might be interested in Rhiannon's recent post titled: **Asexuality**, **aromanticism**, **and Quakers**.

After considering what these terms mean, Rhiannon writes:

So, is there anything which Quakers can say about these experiences? Firstly, I think it's important to say that the Quaker emphasis on personal experience and truth-telling means we start from a position of accepting people's accounts of themselves. Secondly, Quakers value diversity in community and see no reason to encourage everyone to be the same - the existence of sexual and asexual, aromantic and more romantic, people of all sexual orientations and none within our community is well documented, and if we are able to create an atmosphere of trust so that everyone can be open about their experiences we will be the stronger for it.
